Complex Incident Management and WFDSS 2023

As part of a national effort to improve successional planning, balance Incident Management Team (IMT) utilization and better match incident management to incident needs, NWCG introduced Complex Incident Management Teams (CIMT) in 2022. The concept was piloted in the Rocky Mountain GA in 2022 and is targeted for nationwide use in 2023. CIMT's replace T1 and T2 IMT's and may consist of portions of a (previously designated) T1/T2 organization and less complex organizations as the need of the incident dictate. An updated NWCG Wildland Fire Risk and Complexity Assessment (PMS 236) reflects these changes. The most visible change is the addition of Part D. When a T1/CIMT or T2/CIMT organization is selected, Section D allows users to rate and describe needs in the 5 ICS functional areas (Command, Planning, Operations, Finance and Logistics).

Currently, the WFDSS application is not updated to reflect these changes, but the same information required on the PMS 236 form can be entered into the existing fields in the WFDSS application. For Type 5, 4, and 3 incidents, there are no changes from previous years. The greatest difference between the PMS 236 and WFDSS is that WFDSS does not have Part D. The following are suggestions for how to document the information in Part D for a Complex incident (formerly T1/T2) in WFDSS.

Organization Assessment:




Figure 1: Incident Needs Reflected in Implementation Difficulty




Figure 2: : Incident Needs Reflected in Socio/Political Concerns

Incident needs in particular areas can be documented in the Organization Assessment as shown in the Figure 1 and Figure 2, which document needs for enhanced Logistics and Public Information functions.




Figure 3: Incident Needs Reflected in Organization Assessment Notes

The Rationale section of the Decision is an excellent place to recap the needs of the incident and tie them to the incident management organization you have chosen for the incident.




Figure 5: Incident Needs Reflected as Part of the Incident Management Organization
